Lynn Taylor wins national award

Home designer on Oxygen TV

Local residential designer R. Lynn Taylor is one of three women nationwide awarded \$25,000 by the Oxygen cable television network in recognition of their plans for their small businesses.

Oxygen recently flew Taylor and the two other winners to New York, where Taylor filmed a short commercial (now airing locally on the Oxygen Network) and a longervideo about her business.

Also, a small business workshop was held for the winners.

Taylor's five-year-old business, Taylor Made Plans, specializes in designing renovations of older homes and in designing new "infill homes" so they fit attractively into historic neighborhoods.

"Infill homes are those built on

vacant lots within established urban neighborhoods," Taylor said.

She said she has designed more than 20 infill homes that have been built, most in East Nashville,

where her business is located.

Homes designed by Taylor have also been built in Sylvan Park and Germantown.

Taylor sells pre-made plans for urban infill homes on her Web site, www.taylormadeplans.com. She said she plans to begin marketing the designs nationally, beginning primarily in the Southeast.

This plan to nationalize her business is what caught the attention of Oxygen, Taylor said.

She said the next step for her business will be to focus on broadening its name recognition.

16,000 women from across the country entered the Oxygen contest.

"They're pretty cool numbers it's kind of hard to believe," she said.

She said she spent several days filling out the application for the contest.

The applications were judged on the feasibility and economic viability of the businesswoman's plan, creativity and originality, and on the businesswoman's qualifications and ability to execute her idea, according to Taylor.
